Giving the gift of home



Our first home dedication of 2025

Last month, Monroe County Habitat for Humanity had the honor of hosting our first Home Dedication of the year, handing over the keys to a newly renovated home for a local family. The project, completed through our Home Partnership program, took more than 1,500 volunteer hours to complete, and involved the transforming of the house into a safe and secure space. Volunteers, staff, and community members joined together to celebrate this milestone, and to wish the family well as they begin their new chapter in life.

Creating a safe and secure space

The project, completed over the course of 2025, was overseen by our own Site Supervisor, Bill Snell. Here is his direct account on the repairs and upgrades undergone:

"When we first walked into the house it was full of furniture and knick-knacks. After the house was finally emptied, we started our rehab on the second floor. First, we pulled up the rugs and repaired the floor on the one bedroom, then took out the sliding barn door that separated the staircase. Then we started on the bathroom; replaced the flooring and installed shut off valves on that sink and one in the bedroom because neither had them. We replaced the toilet with a new low flush one and resealed around the tub area.

While we worked upstairs, we also were working downstairs where we discovered a closet full of vinyl records, video tapes and room full of books which needed to be moved before we could begin there. In the basement, we discovered that when it rained the basement flooded

because the Bilco door needed to be replaced. Meanwhile we rehabbed the first floor bathroom into a handicapped bath with new flooring and a toilet. We also installed a handicap ramp out front.

With most of the repairs completed we started on painting, starting with the upstairs so they could be re-rugged plus the stairs and then the entire downstairs and the basement.

We decided to replace the oil burner with a new gas one. This began the "oil tank Odessey". The oil tank was an inground one and it took some work to find someone to take it out. The kitchen needed some extra care. The sink needed to be replaced as well as all the appliances. The outside back porch needed attention along with the garage door. All the outlets throughout the house were tested and replaced as needed. The roof had to be replaced and the garage had to be painted and the house and fence were power washed. The out building needed the doors repaired and debugged of ants and wasps. This work was all done by dedicated volunteers: Bob, Paul, Paul, Joe, Joe, and our lunch lady, Elaine. We all hope the family have many happy years living in this home."

Community Development of the Poconos is a recently launched non-profit to focus on housing creation and preservation in the Poconos.

The organization's objectives are:

- Advocacy and Education Working with municipalities to incorporate zoning reform and infrastructure for housing into their ordinances and comprehensive plans.
- Single-family homes Working with organizations such as the Redevelopment Authority and Habitat for Humanity to unlock additional funding for the home preservation and development work they do, plus back-filling roles or capabilities that they don't.
- Multi-Family Homes Developing affordable small rental properties from duplexes to apartments under 35 units in cooperation with special services agencies (Domestic Violence Services, Disability programs) as well as general affordable rental housing.
- Apartment Complexes Attracting larger developers with expertise in creating larger-scale affordable housing (40+ units) and navigating the complex financial requirements involved with funding to keep rents reasonable for seniors and working households.

This organization will help Monroe County Habitat for Humanity in its mission and as a team, we can accomplish more together than working in a silo. Life is a team sport.

Putting God's love into action: Faith Outreach Committee launches Housing Families Grant

"Jesus calls us to love our neighbor, to feed the hungry, and to welcome the stranger." arlier this year, Monroe County Habitat for Humanity's Faith Outreach Committee united local congregations and people of faith with a shared goal: to extend Habitat's mission beyond hammers and nails. The committee quickly discerned a pressing need among neighbors who are transitioning from homelessness into permanent housing – families who, while finally receiving the keys to a safe place, often lack the essentials to make that space a true home.

Guided by the leadership of the Stroudsburg United Methodist Church, the committee created the **Housing Families Grant**, a program that provides household necessities through partnerships with area case managers. These small but essential items offer dignity, stability, and hope as families begin the next chapter of their lives. In recent years, state funds were allocated to other local agencies to provide this essential service, however, that funding is no longer coming to our County, making the Housing Families Grant a critical resource for our community.

This work reflects the heart of Habitat's mission: putting God's love into action. In scripture, Jesus calls us to love our neighbor, to feed the hungry, and to welcome the stranger (Matthew 25:35). Providing a warm bed, a stocked kitchen, and the simple tools of daily living is a tangible way to answer that call. The Housing Families Grant is more than charity—it is a shared act of faith, rooted in the belief that every person deserves not just shelter, but the chance to thrive.

Through the Faith Outreach Committee's leadership, Habitat's ministry continues to grow. Each grant given is a reminder that God's love is best shown through action: meeting practical needs, lifting burdens, and walking alongside families as they build strength, stability, and self-reliance.

Together, we are not only building homes – we are building hope, in the spirit of God's love.

Protecting your home: the importance of maintenance and planning

There's more to owning a house and just paying the mortgage.

Maintenance is an ongoing project. Inevitably things will stop working or break or start leaking. Having an emergency fund for these so-called emergencies is highly recommended. With a good maintenance program, these surprises could be less significant.

Water intrusion is undoubtedly the biggest enemy of a house either from the sky, from the ground or from plumbing issues.

The roof is covered with shingles to protect everything under it. You should know the age of your shingles and plan on replacing them near to the manufacturers' recommended life span, normally 20 or 30 years. An old shingle will get dry and brittle and can crack allowing moisture to soak in and potentially rot the sheeting and eventually the rafters. Roofs should also be equipped with rain gutters. This directs the water away from the foundation that potentially could seep back into the basement or crawlspace. Gutters without leaf guards will need to be cleaned out to keep the rainwater flowing down and away from the foundation.

Basements or crawl spaces are also an area of huge concern when it comes to water intrusion. Many are equipped with a sump pump which must be working in the event of a heavy rainstorm to pump the ground water away before it rises enough to flood this area. You must inspect it occasionally to make sure it is operating properly. A dehumidifier is highly recommended in a basement or crawlspace to keep humidity levels around 50%. High humidity levels can be a source of mold and actually rot wood over a period of time. A vapor barrier on the ground and insulation on the walls will help control the environment so a dehumidifier will work efficiently.

Leaking plumbing can also be a huge issue. When you see a stain on the drywall, don't just ignore it, do some investigating and fix the core problem before it becomes a bigger, more expensive repair.

Dampness around the base of your water heater is a sure sign it's time to replace this appliance. These leaks left unchecked could potentially rot out floors, stud's and joists. I also recommend replacing the flexible waterlines, connecting toilets, faucets, and washing machines per the manufacturer's recommendations.

In addition to all of this, keeping things clean is important as it's easier to detect changes in the color of drywall and so on.

As a homeowner, you need to pay attention to changes in sounds of motors, dripping noise, and even rodent noises and address these issues before they become a major problem.


